

FROM OUR PASTORAL CARE WORKER

A little kindness goes a long way.....

On Thursday February 13, the world celebrated Random Act of Kindness Day. Showing Kindness is one of our school values, and we are always witnessing acts of kindness in our school community. The Australian Childhood Foundation has highlighted some ways that we can encourage kindness in children, creating a culture of empathy, respect and responsibility for others.

Make kindness a part of every day!

Children are always watching and learning from us. When kindness is woven into daily life, it becomes something we practice naturally.

- · Point out acts of kindness when you see them
- · Reflect together. Create conversations such as 'how did it feel when your friend shared with you today?'
 · Make kindness a shared family value. This helps children understand the importance of this in everyday life

Give children opportunities to practice kindness

Kindness is an action! Regular practice helps children develop lifelong empathy and caring habits.

- · Encourage children to help with small tasks (like setting the table)
- · Involve them in giving-donating a toy or making a card for someone
- · Making gratitude a habit-share one thing you appreciated today at dinner or bedtime

Expand childrens 'circle of concern'

Children care most about their own family and friends, but we can gently help them widen their view include new peers and even people they have never met.

- · Read books that explore different perspectives and cultures
 - · Support causes together
- · The more children see and understand different experiences, the more they develop compassion for others

Be a strong role model

Children learn kindness by watching how those around them face challenges, conflicts and interactions. Are we patient with others? Do we show gratitude? How do we respond to mistakes?

- · Speak with kindness
- · Show self-kindness
- · Share your own experiences
- · Children absorb these everyday lessons and reflect them into the world

Small acts of kindness help to create a ripple effect of kindness throughout our school and community, building a community based on positivity, encouragement, empathy and trust.

Parents contacting their child at school

The Department for Education has a set of rules for when it is appropriate for parents to contact their child at school via the Front Office.

Valid reasons include:

- 1. Passing on information in an emergency
 - 2. Collecting a child for an appointment
 - 3. Attending special events
 - 4. Educational meetings
- 5. Assembly, sports day and similar school events
 - 6. Volunteering or working at the school.

Aside from these reasons parents must not be permitted to disrupt their child's learning. At no time should parents make direct contact with students while at school.
